Following simple routes around the school grounds and carrying out an enquiry as to how their playground can be improved  Fieldwork opportunities in lesson 3 and 4</p>	<p><b>What is the weather like in the UK?</b> Looking at the countries and cities that make up the UK, keeping a daily weather record and finding out more about hot and cold places in the UK.  Fieldwork opportunities in lessons 2, 3 and 4</p>	<p><b>What is it like to live in Shanghai?</b> Using a world map to start recognising continents, oceans and countries outside the UK with a focus on China. Children identify physical features of Shanghai using aerial photographs and maps before identifying human features, through exploring land-use. Looking at features in the North and South Poles and Kenya.          Comparing weather and features in the local area. Learning the four compass points. Learning the names and locating the continents of our world.           Fieldwork opportunities in lesson 5</p>	<p><b>Why is our world wonderful?</b>          Learning about the world's wonders, the names and locations of the world's oceans and considering what is unique about the local area.           Fieldwork opportunities in lesson 5</p>	<p><b>What is it like to live by the coast?</b>          Naming and locating continents and oceans of the world while revisiting countries and cities of the UK and surrounding seas. Children learn about the physical features of the Jurassic Coast and how humans have interacted with this, including land use and tourism.           Fieldwork opportunities in lesson 5</p>
<p>Year 3</p>	<p><b>What are rivers and how are they used?</b>          Learning about rivers; their place in the water cycle, the name and location of major rivers and how they are used.           Fieldwork opportunities in lesson 6</p>	<p><b>Who lives in Antarctica?</b>          Learning about how latitude and longitude link to climate and the physical and human features of polar regions with links to the explorer, Shackleton.</p>	<p><b>Are all settlements the same?</b>          Exploring different types of settlements, land use, and the difference between urban and rural. Children describe the different human and physical features in their local area and make land use comparisons with New Delhi.           Fieldwork opportunities in lesson 3</p>

Year 4	<p><b>Why do people live near volcanoes?</b></p> <p>Children learn that the Earth is constructed in layers, and the crust is divided into tectonic plates. They study the formation and distribution of mountains, volcanoes and earthquakes and use Mount Etna to identify how human interaction shapes a volcanic landscape.</p> <p>Fieldwork opportunities in lesson 6</p>	<p><b>Why are rainforests important to us?</b></p> <p>Developing an understanding of biomes, ecosystems and tropics; mapping features of the Amazon rainforest and learning about its layers; investigating how communities in Manaus use the Amazon's resources; discussing the global human impact on the Amazon; and carrying out fieldwork to compare and contrast two types of forest.</p>	<p><b>Where does our food come from?</b></p> <p>Looking at the distribution of the world's biomes and mapping food imports from around the world; learning about trading fairly, focusing on Côte d'Ivoire and cocoa beans; exploring where the food for the children's school dinners comes from and the argument of 'local versus global'.</p> <p>Fieldwork opportunities in lesson 5</p>
